Therefore early vaccination is the best way to protect you and your partner. This flyer contains all the information you need about HPV and the 'vaccination against cancer'.



Which diseases can be caused by HPV?

IN GERMANY, APPROXIMATELY 6,250 WOMEN AND APPROXIMATELY I,600 MEN ARE DIAGNOSED WITH CANCER CAUSED BY HPV EVERY YEAR.

Certain HPV types can cause unpleasant genital warts.



How do I protect myself and others from HPV?

The best way to protect yourself against HPV infection is **vaccination**. Condoms are always important to protect you from sexually transmitted diseases such as AIDS, but vaccination is much better against HPV.

If you want to do everything right, get vaccinated **before the "first time"**. But vaccination still makes sense later on, because any sexual contact can trigger an HPV infection.

Two HPV vaccines are available in Germany. One of the two vaccines protects against a larger number of HPV types that tend to trigger cancer and additionally against genital warts. **Get advice from your doctor.**

A particularly positive factor: If you don't get infected, you can't **pass on** the infection either, protecting your boyfriend or girlfriend.

How safe is vaccination?

Broadly speaking, HPV vaccination is **safe** and **well tolerated**. After vaccination, you may experience redness at the vaccination site, headaches or joint pain, a slight fever or dizziness for a short time. That's usually all that happens. Except that your body builds up a protective barrier against HPV.

The best time is aged 9 - 14 YEARS

> **2 vaccine doses** at least 5 months apart.

However, pathogens such as **HPV**, **the human papillomaviruses**, can also be transmitted through sexual contact. These viruses can cause various types of cancer. With the HPV vaccination, you can reliably protect yourself and others from infection.



Human papillomaviruses (HPV) are widespread and are usually transmitted during **sex**.



HPV infections are often harmless. Certain HPV types, however, can cause various types of cancer and genital warts.



A timely vaccination can protect you very reliably. The **HPV vaccination** is recommended for **girls and boys from 9 to 14 years of age**. The sooner the better. However, it is also possible at a later date.
